The Mayor and Town Council are proud to be participating in The American Cancer Society's 80% by 2018 Pledge, working to increase colorectal cancer screening rates to 80%.



Did you know Colorectal Cancer is the third most commonly diagnosed cancer in both men and women in the United States? Many people who should be getting screened for colon cancer are not.

The American Cancer Society recommends colon cancer screening begin at age 50 for people at average risk. People with certain risk

factors may need to begin screening earlier or get screened more often. Talking to a doctor is the best way to find out about when to begin screening.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

As we get in to warmer weather, residents should remember to

maintain all grass and vegetation at a reasonable height in order to keep the community beautiful. Residents should also be mindful of stagnant water in uncovered pools, loose tires, buckets, etc. Unused swimming pools should be drained and properly covered to

prevent water accumulation and mosquito breeding. If there is an abandoned swimming pool in your neighborhood, please contact our office at 201-330-2031.

Also, the Property Maintenance Office will be working on a project this summer regarding house numbering. Municipal code requires the numbers on all homes be bold, clearly visible and prominently displayed. Residents who do not have address numbers on their home, or the numbers are not bold, prominent, and in good repair may receive a notice from our office regarding the ordinance requirements. This is very important for proper home identification and public safety.

Environmental Department Announces Rocket Composter

In the United States, nearly 40% of all food becomes waste. This past year, the Secaucus Environmental Department received a \$20,000 grant to purchase a state of the art A-500 Rocket Composter to be used at the High School this coming Fall.

With the help of students from the High School Environmental Club, the High School will be on the leading edge of sustainability.

The students are encouraged to separate food waste for the Rocket Composter. Not only will this be beneficial to the environment, it will help save the Town money by reducing waste transportation. Also, with funding provided by a Robert Wood Johnson Grant, 12 interns will be working



with the Town of Secaucus this upcoming summer to incentivize restaurants to become part of our Food Waste Pilot Program. The plan is to reduce and collect food waste, and repurpose it into compost.

The goal of utilizing the Rocket Composter is to reduce the hundreds of tons of food waste and scraps that we send to landfills every year as well as reducing the CO2 emissions generating from its transportation. Preventing food waste reduces Greenhouse Gas Emissions and reduces waste in landfills.

New Community Garden Plots

The Community has actively participated in the Fountain Park Community Garden since it's opening in 2012. When the garden was first established, it had only 4 plots. From the original 4 plots, the Fountain Park Community Garden expanded to 8 plots, then 14 plots over the span of 5 years. In preparation for the upcoming planting season, the Town of Secaucus has installed 10 new additional plots in Fountain Park to be used by fellow community members. The Secaucus gardening season officially began on Mother's Day.

We are looking to expand the other community garden in Town, located at Laurel Hill behind Xchange. In addition to the existing gardens, the Town is in the very early planning stages of developing two new community gardens, to be located at the ends of Farm Road and Maple Street.

Applications to reserve plots become available February of each year. Plots are given out on a first come, first serve basis and all spaces are typically fully reserved by early April. Community Garden Plots are currently all occupied for the 2018 season, but if you are interested in reserving a plot for next season, please contact Lynn at lkramer@secaucus.net.
