Recycled Batteries Get a New Life



The Secaucus Environmental Department is proud to announce that more than 1000 lbs. of batteries and small electronics were collected since the Big Green Box program started in 2015. Big Green Boxes are set up at several locations around Town where residents can drop off used batteries and unwanted small electronics including cell phones, calculators, handheld games and small tablets. Collected materials are sent for recycling where metals such as zinc, cadmium, manganese, aluminum and lithium are retrieved for re-use. This prevents pollution of soil, underground water and waterways. Batteries thrown in trash can leach metals and other chemicals into the soil when the outer casing disintegrates.

Do your part to prevent pollution and other harmful effects caused by discarding batteries in the trash. Drop off used batteries and small electronics in the Big Green Box at any of these locations: Town Hall Lobby, 20 Center Ave (2nd floor), Recreation Center, Secaucus Public Library, DPW Office at 370 Secaucus Rd., Harmon Cove 1 Club House, Harmon Cove Towers (Management Office), Teen Center (Front Street), High School (Mr. Ron Mroz or Denise Edmunds) Clarendon School, Xchange (5000 Building) and The Harper.

The Secaucus Police Department, volunteer firefighters, teachers and students from Secaucus School District, along with other residents participated in a Torch Run on June 7, 2019 to raise funds for the Special Olympics.



Athletes participated in the largest competition of the year at the 2019 Summer Games on June 7th through the 9th at The College of New Jersey in Ewing Township.

"We are proud to be part of the Torch Run, which we've been doing for several years now. This year we raised about \$7,000.00 as a result of the Torch Run and other events, which will help children participate in the Special Olympics and to raise awareness about this impressive event," said Secaucus Police Captain Carlos Goyenechea, who organized the fundraiser.

The Torch Run route touched both elementary schools, Clarendon and Huber Street, and made

its way to the Middle School-High School campus. All participants were later invited to a community gettogether and barbeque at the Secaucus Swim Club.

Other fundraising efforts for the Special Olympics included a charity basketball game on Wednesday, May 15th between the Secaucus PBA and the staff of Hudson Regional Hospital at the Secaucus Recreation Center. The game was both competitive and friendly at the same time. Secaucus PBA won the game.

The New Jersey Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics is one of the top fundraising events for the Special Olympics. Secaucus law enforcement, firefighters and school district have actively participated in the Torch Run fundraiser for the last four years.

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
