Outbreak of Lung Injury Associated with E-Cigarette Use/Vaping: Secaucus Takes Action

As of October 22, 2019, 1,604 lung injury cases associated with the use of e-cigarette, or vaping products have been reported to CDC from 49 states. Thirty-four deaths have been confirmed in 24 states.

Dave Bratton and members of the Secaucus Coalition have given presentations about vaping to hundreds of parents at Back to School Nights, thanks to the Secaucus Middle/High Schools and High Tech High School. The Coalition has also given out hundreds of pamphlets about vaping to parents and community members. Teen Coalition members have created posters for their schools and placed substance abuse/vape prevention messages on their classmates' lockers.

The Secaucus Coalition has also met with the Mayor and Town Council, the Board of Health and the Secaucus Health Department. "Our officials have been extremely responsive and supportive," said Bratton. "We are collaboratively implementing recommended strategies in order to reduce the harms of e-cigarettes among our community members and youth."

Secaucus Museum Snake Hill Movie

Over 40 people gathered in the Town Museum's Movie Screening Room on the afternoon of October 24th to view "Snake Hill," a documentary about the Laurel Hill/Snake Hill institutions. Viewers learned the history of the campus and that it is believed that over 10,000 human remains were buried in the Snake Hill and New Jersey Turnpike area. With 4,571 sets of bones found, the largest disinterment in the United States occurred right in Hudson County. An educational afternoon was had by all. Secaucus - Home of The Celery King



In September, Mayor Michael Gonnelli, The Town Council, and The Town Museum Directors dedicated a plaque at 325 County Avenue to Sebastian Meisch "The Celery King," who had a 20-acre farm at the site. He developed and cultivated a hybrid variety of celery known as "Meisch's Special Celery" or "Meisch's Wonderful Celery." The hybrid seeds were sold to farmers across the country and his celery is the variety still grown and sold nationwide today.

Meisch was a German immigrant who moved to Secaucus in the early 1890's. He was elected mayor of Secaucus in 1911 and his success as a farmer eventually led to great wealth and influence in Secaucus.

The Meisch farm was sold in the

1920's to developer Curtis Wright with potential plans to build an airport on County Avenue. The plans were later abandoned.
