Secaucus Bans Retail Use of Carryout Plastic Bags

On August 27th, Secaucus Mayor Michael Gonnelli and the Town Council passed an Ordinance banning the use of single-use plastic bags in Town. With this ban, Secaucus joins municipalities nationwide that are actively trying to reduce the environmental impacts of plastic pollution. The goal is to reduce single-use plastic bags and promote the

use of reusable carryout bags. The ban comes into effect on February 1, 2020, after which businesses in Secaucus will no longer be allowed to offer single-use plastic bags (carryout bags) to their customers. Businesses may provide a reusable bag or a paper carryout bag provided they collect a minimum fee of 10 cents for each single-use paper carryout bag. All paper carryout bags must be 100% recyclable with a minimum of 40% post-consumer recycled content.

Residents are encouraged to bring their own reusable bags and/or use paper bags multiple times so less material ends up in landfills. The Environmental Department will be distributing a limited number of reusable bags to residents. The Town will also seek help from local private entities and not-for-profit organizations to provide and distribute reusable carryout bags to residents and stores.



Certain bags are exempt: small produce bags without handles, laundry or dry-cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, bags sold in packages intended for garbage, pet-waste or yard waste, and bags provided by pharmacies for prescription drugs. Please re-use these bags whenever possible or drop off bags at places that offer recycling for clean plastic bags. "Plastic bags are a huge problem here. Our crews go out and they pick up loads of plastic bags near creeks, stuck in fences, in parking lots, in the meadows and in parks. We need to fix this and we are hopeful that the Plastic Bag Ordinance will help raise awareness and change behavior," said Mayor Michael Gonnelli.

Amanda Nesheiwat, Director at the Environmental Department, said that the Department will be meeting with businesses to explain the details of the plastic bag-ban. "We want businesses in town and retail establishments to be a partner in this effort. We want to make it as easy as possible for them. We have to work together to tackle the problem of plastic pollution," she added.

Secaucus Awarded New Drug Free Communities Grant

Secaucus was awarded a five-year grant by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) for the Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program. This program's goal is to prevent and reduce youth substance abuse through local initiatives and community-based efforts. The \$125,000 per year grant will fund a variety of prevention and youth substance abuse education programs primarily through the Secaucus Coalition. "The DFC will continue to be an instrumental piece of our Town's efforts to reduce youth substance abuse in our community, especially given the e-cigarette/vaping epidemic. We have made great strides in the last 5 years through the Secaucus Coalition, and we will continue to address the dangerous substance abuse challenges our youth face today," said Dave Bratton, Coordinator of the Secaucus Coalition.

This is the second time that this highly competitive, five-year grant was awarded to Secaucus. This award is testament to the great work the Coalition has done over the years in implementing substance abuse prevention strategies.



CAST Goes to the Movies

CAST, a not-for-profit community theater group in Secaucus, presented a production of "CAST Goes to the Movies" which featured popular songs from classic movies. With two performances at the Arthur F. Couch Performing Arts Center on November 8th and 9th, it showcased amazing local talent. The sixteen young residents who participated in the show gained valuable experience in musical theater. They were involved in all aspects of the show, including on-stage performance, audio, lighting and set design/stage crew. Over 300 people attended the show over two days and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive.

CAST was started by long-time friends and theatre-lovers Pat DeFerrari and Joan Kashuba more than 30 years ago. Since then, CAST has produced and staged several shows at the Performing Arts Center, High School Cafeteria, Buchmuller Park, the Senior Center and Immaculate Conception Church. Proceeds from CAST productions go back to the community in the form of scholarships to Secaucus residents graduating from high school who plan on pursuing the arts or furthering their education in arts.



Veteran Paul Pinkman Honored as Secaucus Veteran of the Year

Vietnam veteran and Secaucus resident Paul Pinkman was honored with the Hudson County Veteran of the Year award at the 2019 Veterans Day Ceremony held at High Tech High School on November 7, 2019. He joined the Air Force in 1964 when he was 17 and completed two tours of duty by 1968. Paul was born in Hoboken, however, has been a resident of Secaucus for 51 years. He is married to his loving wife, Betty Ann, for fifty years and has two daughters, Dena and Kara, and six grandchildren.

A decorated veteran, Paul has been honored with several medals including Republic of Vietnam Medal with Cluster, Vietnam Service Medal with Cluster, Air Force Commendation Medal, Air Force Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Service Medal, Republic of Vietnam Medal of Honor, Purple Heart, New Jersey Distinguished Service Medal and New Jersey Vietnam Service Medal.

Paul has continued to serve the community after military service and is currently the Master of the Fourth Degree for the Knights of Columbus, overseeing over 400 Knights who honor the veterans with parades, ceremonies or burials, when requested. He is also the Knights of **Columbus North Veterans Assistance** Coordinator and helps veterans with housing needs, supplies wheelchairs and assists homeless veterans. Paul also uses his talents as a plumber and helps veterans upgrade their homes, assists with plumbing problems, and coordinates construction efforts. As if all these volunteer activities do not keep Paul busy enough, he finds time to distribute clothes and food to homeless shelters.

Town Bags Grant for Duck Pond Rehabilitation

The Mayor and Town Council are pleased to announce that the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) and the Garden State Preservation Trust have approved a grant to rehabilitate the Duck Pond located on Metro Way. The \$325,000 matching grant will help the Town clean up and improve the Duck Pond area, home of the annual Secaucus Fishing Derby each May. Rehabilitation plans include new benches, a walkway on the entire perimeter of the pond, new landscaping and a gazebo-like seating area. Situated in the midst of warehouses and office buildings, the Duck Pond offers a serene and tranquil spot that many residents enjoy. It's a popular spot for families to enjoy fishing during the warmer months.

"Secaucus is blessed with a lot of natural beauty and our goal is to preserve open spaces for all our residents. We are pleased we were awarded this competitive grant, which will allow us to make the Duck Pond even better," said Mayor Michael J. Gonnelli.

If you have not visited the Duck Pond yet, drive by and enjoy this urban oasis. If you fish here, remember it is a catch-and-release only location. You probably won't see the alligator that was spotted in 2017, but you'll appreciate the variety of water fowl swimming in the pond, including ducks, of course!
