Police and Fire Department personnel, dressed in full uniform, lined the aisles of the Council Chamber and the lobby as the first Council Meeting of the year began. They were joined by family and friends who gathered that evening to witness and cheer those who were sworn in to the Police Department and Volunteer Fire Department.

First, Troy Conville (Engine 3), Michael Schoendorf and Lucas Kloepping (both Rescue 1/Engine 2), Mathew Bienkowski (Tower 2), Joe Franks and Mathew Mattola (Ladder 1/Engine 4) and Yash Patel (Engine 1) took the oath as Captains of the Fire Department.





This was followed by the oath of office as Captains by Jason Leppin (Engine 3), Joseph Schoendorf Jr. (Rescue 1/Engine 2), John Bujnowski (Tower 2), Mark Mastorelli (Ladder 1/Engine 4) and David Hayashida (Engine 1).

Six new Probationary Police officers were also sworn in. Peter Maraldo, Christopher Miller, Dwight Wise, David Delseni, Michael Borrelli and Jason Mitchell successfully completed all of the testing requirements. Police Chief Kevin Flaherty wished them well and advised them "to never stop learning and to remember, it's not a sprint, it's a marathon."

"The safety and security of our residents is of utmost importance, and we are committed to keeping our Police and Fire departments strong and well-equipped. I welcome all new members and wish them the best as they serve the residents of our Town," said Mayor Gonnelli.

You probably do not know that an American family of four sends about 1,160lbs. of food waste into garbage every year. The Environmental Department continues to find ways to help our residents live an environmentally friendly life with fewer negative impacts. The Department has been getting guidance from the NJ Composting Council to turn our excess food waste (food scraps, vegetable and fruit peels, unused food items etc.) into usable compost so we can reduce the amount of trash we send to a landfill.

Emergency Preparedness for Special Needs

The Secaucus Office of Emergency Management (OEM) reminds residents with special needs to take these additional steps so first responders and utility personnel can plan and support them in case of an emergency.

For Users of Life-Sustaining Equipment:

If a family member or someone you know relies on electricity to run life-sustaining equipment in their home, like a respirator or dialysis machine, please advise them to register their equipment with PSE&G. They can call PSE&G at 1-800 - 436 -7734 or they can use the application on the website: PSEG.com/life.

For Residents with Special Needs:

You (or someone on your behalf) are encouraged to register with **NJ Register Ready** if you have a physical, developmental, cognitive or behavioral impairment, language barrier, or transportation challenge that may make it difficult for you to safely shelter in place or evacuate in a disaster. Go to: www.registerready.nj.gov to fill out a form, or call 2-1-1 (within NJ), or 1-877-652-1148 toll free. **NJ Register Ready** is free, voluntary, secure and confidential.

You can also reach the Secaucus Office of Emergency Management at 201-864-1061. Remember, in case of an immediate emergency, call 9-1-1.

Plaque Dedicated to Volunteer Emergency Squad


Michael Gonnelli Mayor and members of the Town Council were present as a special plaque honoring the Secaucus Volunteer Emergency Squad for the Town of Secaucus was installed and dedicated on December 28th in front of the Town Hall Annex at 20 Center Avenue. The statement on the Plaque reads, in part, "What we have done for ourselves alone dies with us: what we have done for others and the world remains and is immortal." The plaque dedication ceremony was followed by a special event at the Town Museum where a display featuring gear worn by emergency volunteers was unveiled. The gear was donated by



former member Sal Manente. An official Proclamation detailing the contributions of the Secaucus Volunteer Emergency Squad and thanking them on behalf of all residents of the Town was also read. The Proclamation will be displayed at the Town Museum.

The Secaucus Volunteer Emergency Squad was formed in 1973 and made immense contributions to our community until 1988. Members responded to emergencies including fires, accidents, and floods to ensure the safety and well-being of residents, all on a volunteer basis. We thank all members who served on the squad for their selflessness and commitment.

File of Life: A Must-Have for All



Hudson Regional Hospital, in partnership with Secaucus Mayor Michael Gonnelli and the Town Council, invite all residents to take part in the File of Life program. The File of Life is a foldable card that residents can fill in with their medical information. The card is placed in a red magnetic file that first responders are trained to look for on the refrigerator or in the freezer. It assists them in providing care to patients even if they are not able to communicate in the time of emergency. Hudson Regional Hospital can arrange File of Life cards to be dropped off for homebound residents on request.

"I hope all residents take a few minutes to fill out the File of Life. It's a great program, and a simple way to make sure your medical information is easily available in case of a medical emergency," said Mayor Michael Gonnelli.

"Medical emergencies can happen to anyone at any time, and a patients' confusion, panic or inability to

provide information on current medical issues can interfere with their care," said Kristin Hyman, Chief of EMS for Hudson Regional Hospital. "The File for Life card can speak for them and can tell public safety dispatchers, police officers, firefighters and paramedics what steps to take to save their lives."
