
Mayor's Corner

Secaucus Coalition Launches New Video



The Secaucus Coalition launched a new video on YouTube to highlight the loss that results from addictive behaviors. "Echoes" is a poignant collection of portraits of artists whose lives were cut short due to addiction. "It was an idea I had for a long time and just could not shake," said Dave Bratton, Secaucus Coalition Coordinator and creator of the video. Given the COVID-19 pandemic, some activities scheduled for the Coalition and its student organization, KAI, had to be put on pause or changed to a virtual format. "Videos are a way of continuing our prevention efforts in our community and beyond," he added. In just a few weeks after its launch, the video garnered more than 1,100 views and has been shared by many other organizations, an impressive response in the prevention field. Secaucus Police Officers Resuscitate 75-Year-Old Woman

On November 1, 2020 at 5:58 P.M., the Secaucus Police Department received a 9-1-1 call that a 75-year-old woman was suffering from severe chest pains and having complications with her breathing. Police Officer David Delseni was first to arrive at the residence, located on the 600 block of 9th Street.

Upon his arrival, Police Officer Delseni found the victim lying supine, turning blue with agonal breathing. Police Officer Delseni began to provide "rescue breaths" to the victim, but her condition worsened, and she became unresponsive. The victim's breathing stopped, and no pulse could be found. At this time Police Officers Delseni, Michael Borrelli and Matthew Kirvin began to administer Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). While performing CPR, the officers utilized their Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and administered a "shock" to the victim and a pulse was found shortly thereafter by Hudson Regional Hospital EMT's who also arrived on the scene.

The victim was transported to the hospital and at the time of this press release she is recovering in the Intensive Care Unit. "I am extremely proud of these officers and commend their perseverance in performing these lifesaving measures. I am especially proud that these officers utilized their training and the equipment provided to them, worked as a team and were able to bring this victim back to life," Chief Dennis Miller said.

Recycling This Holiday Season

Ever heard of wish-cycling? You toss a tricky item in your recycling container, hoping it will get recycled. Unfortunately, simply wishing for something to be recyclable doesn't make it so. Wish-cycling is one of the biggest issues facing our municipal recycling program. While this is a year-round problem, it gets worse during the holidays.

Know What Can & Cannot be Recycled Curbside:

- Download the free Recycle Coach app (RecycleCoach.com/Download-App).
- Recycle Coach has Secaucus-specific curbside collection information and a resourceful "What Goes Where?" Search Tool.
- To-date, the Environmental Department has uploaded information for over 100 items and how they can be donated, recycled, or discarded.


Cardboard & Paper Recycling:

- It is mandatory to flatten cardboard and have any other attached materials removed such as Styrofoam, bubble-wrap, tape, or plastic.
- Gift wrap: only items that are 100% paper can be recycled in curbside collection. Anything that contains non-paper additives cannot be included, such as ribbons, rope handles, glitter, wax, foil-type paper, etc.

Police Officer Kowlessar Saves Infant's Life




Police Officer Mikhail Kowelessar was honored with a Proclamation at the October 27th Town Council meeting for saving the life of an infant. On October 7th, the Police Department received a frantic phone call from a father whose infant was turning blue. Police officers responded to their home and found that the five-month-old baby boy was not breathing. When the officers arrived, the infant's mother was administering CPR as

directed by the dispatcher who received the emergency call. Police Officer Kowlessar swiftly stepped in and administered back slaps in accordance with his training. The infant spit up clear liquid and began to breathe on his own before he was transported to Hackensack University Medical Center. Thank you, Officer Kowlessar for your swift and professional action, which saved the infant's life.

Major Upgrades Coming to Mill Ridge Fields

Major upgrades are coming to the Mill Ridge Fields area thanks to a recently awarded \$500,000.00 Open Space Grant from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP). The Town is also looking to reprogram additional Open Space funds previously awarded to this project. Improvements will include a completely reconstructed field with new turf surface. This is a major step towards making the area one of the Town's premier parks, a goal that the Mayor and Town Council have been working on as a priority. Over the last few years, Mill Creek Point received many upgrades including a new playground, gazebos, additional parking, a dog park, archery range and a complete reconstruction of the portion of Mill Ridge Road leading



into the park. "Our Town is blessed with scenic riverfront open areas and we are doing our best not just to preserve them as open space but also make the best use of these spaces to support our residents' recreation needs. The grant will help us upgrade one of the ball fields with minimal impact on our budget," said Mayor Michael Gonnelli. The area has become one of the most used parks in Town offering walking trails, a boardwalk, breathtaking sunrise and sunset views, children's play areas, ball fields and lots of opportunity to watch wildlife, including diamondback turtles and a variety of birds.

Library History Added to Rock Garden

Secaucus is a beautiful, art-filled and community-spirited Town. From seasonal flowers and street-deco to murals to the relatively new rock garden, we have ways to show off our hometown pride. Our murals are obvious, but if you don't know about the rock garden, it's time you checked it out! Located on 1st Avenue, right by the Little League Ball Field near Buchmuller Park.
