Community Composting Program is Here!

On average, 1,160 lbs. of food are lost to the garbage pail each year by an American family of four. To help reduce the amount of food waste our community sends to the landfill, the Secaucus Environmental Department, with the support of Mayor Gonnelli and the Town Council, are excited to announce the launch of a pilot residential food scraps drop-off program. Separating food scraps from regular garbage is an easy way to divert waste from the landfill and help our environment. We invite you to participate in the program to ensure it can continue after the six-month pilot period is over.



How it works:

We have five drop-off locations for easy access to residents in different parts of Town. Each of the drop-off sites have a locked enclosure shed where registered residents can deposit food scraps such as eggshells, fruit and vegetable peels, coffee grinds, tea leaves, flowers, and more into collection bins. These bins are picked up weekly by a compost company. We request everyone who is interested in the program to please visit our website secaucusnj.gov/compost or call 201-864-7336. There, you will find a link to a short registration survey. The Environmental Department will then email you an access code to unlock the enclosure shed at your selected location. Food scraps can be dropped off any-time from Saturday through Tuesday.

Help reduce food waste that ends up in landfills. Please sign up to participate and make our new composting program a resounding success.

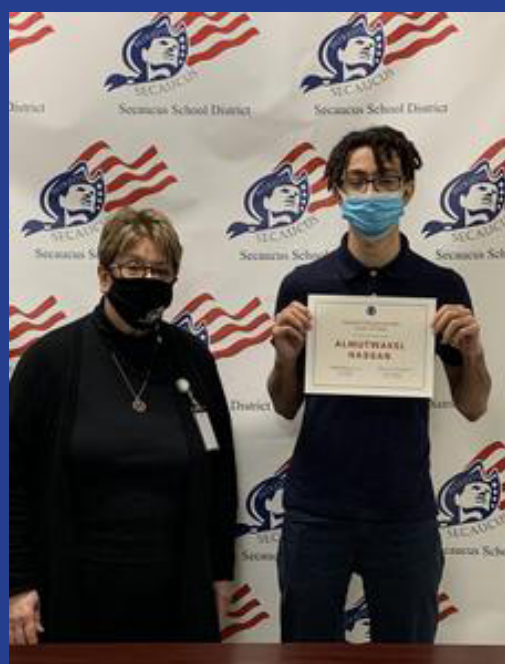

Secaucus High School Class of 2021 Graduates



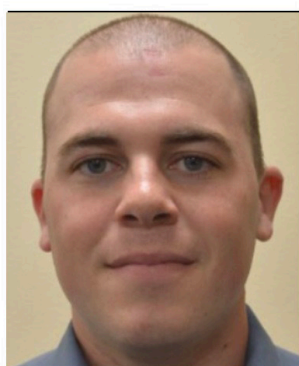

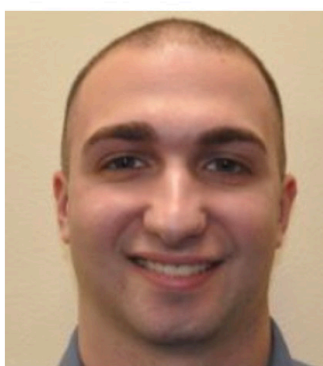
Secaucus Police Officers Resuscitate 59-Year-Old Man

On June 12, 2020 at 8:33 A.M., the Secaucus Police Department received a medical alarm at Long Shot Gun Range (375 County Avenue).

Upon his arrival, Police Officer Philip Caruso found the victim not breathing and no pulse could be found. Police Officer Caruso began Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). At this time, Police Officers Matthew Kirvin and Kristen Bronowich arrived and assisted with CPR. While performing CPR, the officers utilized their Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and administered two “shocks” to the victim and a pulse was found shortly thereafter by Hudson Regional Hospital EMT’s who also arrived on the scene.

The victim was transported to the hospital and at the time of this press release he is in stable condition in the Intensive Care Unit. “I am extremely proud of these officers and commend their determination in performing these lifesaving measures. I am especially proud that these officers utilized their training and the equipment provided to them, worked as a team and were able to bring this victim back to life,” Chief Dennis Miller said.

Paddling in the Hackensack

Looking for outdoorsy things to do in Secaucus? Make the most of the Hackensack River watershed through independent or guided paddleboat tours. Canoes and kayaks can be rented at Laurel Hill Park boat launch on Saturdays and Sundays from 9:00 AM to 7:00 PM, weather permitting. Last rental is at 3:00 PM. Suggested donation is \$25 per paddler and \$15 per passenger for a canoe, and \$25 per paddler for kayak rentals (four hours).

Moonlight Paddles are also available and are a great way to explore the Meadowlands with experienced guides under the light of the moon. Solo paddlers are welcome on guided tours. On Sundays at high tide, experienced guides take up to ten paddlers on a two-hour exploration of Sawmill Creek Marsh with spectacular views of both Newark and the entire Manhattan skyline. If you own a kayak and canoe, you can use the launch at either Laurel Hill Park or Mill Creek Marsh. This will allow you to see Secaucus and all of its beauty from a new vantage point!

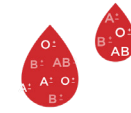
