Mayor's Corner

On September 1st, Tropical Storm Ida brought more than 7 inches of rain in a short period of time, flooding many areas including some sections of our Town. While we don't have direct control over these types of weather events, I am immensely moved by the way the community came together in the aftermath of the storm. I heard countless stories of neighbors checking on and helping neighbors. I saw first-hand how members of the Department of Public Works, Police Department, Fire Department and the Office of Emergency Management worked incessantly as reports of street and basement flooding came in. Some of them helped others even as their own homes were being affected. I thank each one of you for your dedication, hard work and selflessness.

As you work through the recovery process, please know that we are here to make rebuilding easy for you. Our Construction Office has been working tirelessly to issue permits for home repairs and replacements of major appliances. We have also waived permit fees for storm related repairs to make it easier for you

While this storm was devastating, we should be aware that this may not be an isolated event. Weather patterns are changing, and severe weather has become more frequent than in the recent past. The Town's elevation and location on the banks of the Hackensack River close to the Newark Bay affects all of us. Flood mitigation has been and remains a top priority for me, the Town Council, and my administration. We continue to engage with professionals, engineers and State and County officials to



find ways to mitigate flooding. Over the last few years, we have made considerable progress with improved pumping stations, higher berms, cleaner catchment basins, storm drain replacement and more. We will not stop there. We are committed to finding even more solutions that are effective and long term. We also continue to apply for state and county grants to help offset the costs. I will keep you updated with the progress we make.

Rotary Club of Secaucus Hosts Charity Poker Tournament

The Rotary Club of Secaucus has been involved in the community for several decades. Their presence and kind acts can be seen throughout town. Their involvement has included: contributing Rosetta language CDs and helping build a gazebo at the Secaucus Public Library, purchasing body armor and donating bicycles for the Secaucus Police Department, collecting for the Secaucus Food Pantry, providing scholarships to graduating students and offering baby care information for new mothers.

Most recently, the Rotary Club held a Poker Tournament on Saturday September 25th at the VFW Hall to continue their community work. The buy-in was \$100 per player. The event was licensed by the State of New Jersey with licensed dealers provided by Mike's Poker Tables LLC. Top players received a share of \$4,000 in gift cards.

Part of the proceeds of the Poker Tournament will be sent to the Secaucus Food Pantry and Secaucus Emergency Fund. Funds will also be allocated to other community projects in the months ahead.

On September 1st when Tropical Storm Ida wreaked havoc on our community, flooding many homes that are not typically affected by heavy rains, volunteers were there to help. Just a few minutes after a Swiftreach phone message was sent to residents requesting volunteers, Town Hall received many calls from eager residents who were ready to help. Two clean-up days were organized where residents helped those affected by removing wet and soiled items, such as small furniture and appliances, from inside homes to the curb for pick up by DPW. The task was not easy as items tend to get heavy when wet. A big "thank you" goes out to all residents who offered to help. Your assistance made a huge difference to every neighbor you helped!



Enhanced Incentives on Energy Efficient from PSE&G The PSE&G Clean Energy Future Energy Efficiency Program has developed enhanced program incentives to help residential, commercial & industrial customers impacted by Tropical Storm Ida. Customers located in Secaucus, and in other disaster areas as designated by FEMA, who receive electric or gas service from PSE&G are eligible.

New Pooch Paper Coming to Dog Waste Dispensers

The Secaucus Environmental Department and the Department of Public Works are bringing an environmentally friendly solution to doggie waste dispensers in Town. Instead of plastic bags, dispensers around Town will soon carry specially coated Pooch Paper. Pooch Paper is a recycled, biodegradable, compostable, non-chlorine paper alternative with grease-resistant coating. The product is manufactured using renewable energy, so it's environmentally friendly in more ways than one. It is widely acknowledged that each year about 500 million plastic dog waste bags clog our landfills. These bags don't biodegrade but break up into micro plastic particles that end up in the air or in our waterways. Also, when plastic and dog waste are compressed in landfills, methane gas (which is more toxic than carbon dioxide) is released. Because Pooch Paper is biodegradable, it reduces both those adverse effects of traditional plastic bags.

"Sustainability starts with each and every one of us," said Pooch Paper Founder Tracy Rosensteel. "If we contribute one small effort such as switching a daily consumable from plastic to recycled paper, we can all help save our planet one pup at a time!"

Customer must participate in PSE&G's Energy Efficiency Program and follow all applicable Program rules. The enhanced incentives are to assist customers in purchasing new qualifying energy-efficient equipment and appliances between September 1 and November 15, 2021. Customers will be required to complete and submit a certification form to receive enhanced PSE&G will offer the enhanced incentives only to customers that directly apply to PSE&G.

Residential Incentives:

An additional \$200 for qualifying HVAC and water heating equipmentAn additional \$50 for qualifying refrigerators and clothes washers

Commercial & Industrial Incentives:

- An increase of up to 50% to existing incentives for qualifying equipment

They were selected to represent New Jersey in the National Public Service Pitch Day. Students Alyssa delos Santos, Saniya Tasnim, Sophia Benavente, Liz Garcia, Samyan Mangat, Carlihanny Sanchez and Srimti Chopra presented at the national event and are waiting for the results announcement.

Secaucus Cares SIA Group also received a \$500 grant to continue with service projects, an Advisor of the Year award, a Gold Award Banner, and a Best Blog Award. Hygiene Project's SIA group has been participating in the annual Multiplying Good for five years, earning 4 Gold Banners and 1 Silver Banner. This program provides training for young leaders, helping them discover their purpose and multiply the good they achieve.

Community Comes Together After Tropical Storm Ida

On September 1, 2021, Tropical Storm Ida brought more than 7 inches of rain in a few hours. The storm had already wreaked havoc from Louisiana all the way up the eastern seaboard. New Jersey was one of the worst hit states in the Northeast, which led to the announcement of FEMA Major

Disaster Declaration in 12 counties, including Hudson. In Secaucus, several roadways were flooded, and sewer and storm drain systems were overwhelmed despite all pumping stations working at full capacity. More than 200 homes and businesses were flooded, and many cars were submerged, including some that were deemed a total loss. Many residents living here for decades reported that this was the first time their basements were flooded. The unprecedented rain caused damage to property, but thankfully there were no casualties in Town.

Even before the rainfall totals started stacking up, several Secaucus departments mobilized to respond to potential flooding. The Office of Emergency Management monitored the weather and issued ongoing communications. The Secaucus Police Department cordoned off and set up warning devices to alert drivers to flooded roadways. Officers from the Patrol Division and Anti-crime Unit used High Water Rescue vehicles to rescue 40 individuals from waters that were as high as chest deep. Waters were so treacherous that a specialized vehicle had to be used to transport fire department personnel so they could respond to emergency calls. This was truly an unprecedented event.

Prior to the start of the storm, our Department of Public Works (DPW) was at the ready. They worked tirelessly throughout the night responding to calls and helping residents. On the night of the storm, the DPW pumped water out of more than 90 homes. Crews also checked and cleared accumulated debris on roadways and near storm drain systems. The DPW continued to work for many days after the storm to help with the cleanup efforts.

Mayor Michael Gonnelli and members of the Town Council toured the affected areas of Town, talked with residents, assessed the damage, and immediately announced several initiatives to help residents. The Administration disseminated several rounds of communications to guide residents with needed



information for clean-up and recovery. The Secaucus Public Library was designated as a temporary secure shelter for residents who needed it. The

Police Department removed over 120 vehicles that were abandoned and were blocking the roadways. DPW made continuous rounds of bulk trash pickup as residents started piling their damaged items curbside. Over 280 tons of extra rubbish were picked up in just one week after the storm.



Flood related construction permit fees were waived, and the Construction Department worked diligently to approve permits. Two volunteer sessions comprised of residents were organized for those who needed help bringing storm-impacted items from their homes to the curb. The Social Services Department welcomed all affected residents to the Community Store to pick-up needed items such as clothes, shoes, linens, and accessories. The SMUA conducted checks of all drains to make sure there were no obstructions.

Mayor Gonnelli and the Town Council worked closely with Congressman Pascrell's Office to ensure Hudson County was included on the Major Disaster Declaration list. On September 10th, Hudson County was included in the Declaration, which means residents, businesses and the Town can apply for FEMA grants and loans to help recover from losses suffered during Tropical Storm Ida. Initially, FEMA related information was available on our website www.secaucusnj.gov or the FEMA website www.disasterassistance.gov and help was available at the Department of Social Services. On September 18th, Secaucus became the only Town in Hudson County with a FEMA Disaster Recovery Center (DRC)

that offers in-person assistance. The center, located at the Secaucus Public Library, is open 7 days a week and welcomes residents and businesses to receive help regarding the application process, questions, types of funding available and more.

Rotary Pitches in to Feed Secaucus Residents

The Rotary Club of Secaucus participated in a global effort to reduce hunger. They contacted concerned organizations in the area for donations of money and food items to benefit the Secaucus Food Pantry under the leadership of Lisa Snedeker and her team.

Currently, the Food Pantry is helping over 200 families and seniors on a weekly basis. It takes about \$3,500 each week to provide basic food items to these residents. The Rotary Club was able to collect 206 bags/boxes of non-perishable food items and \$2,842 in cash donations.



Some of the companies that donated funds were: Logmein, U.S. Tech Solutions, Hudson Regional Hospital, John from Yalie Cleaners, and Keller Williams's Agnes Bowman. Bags/boxes of food were collected from Cathy Wolf's Secaucus Cares students, Stacey Lee and the students in S.A.I.L., and the Clarendon and

Huber Street school students. Community minded individuals in town also dropped off bags of food at Rotarian Phil Papa's Travel Store.

The effort raised enough food and money to feed Secaucus residents in need for two weeks. A check for \$2,842 was presented to Lisa Snedeker at the September 28, 2021 Town Council meeting with members of Rotary in attendance.
