Mayor's Corner

I am excited to share the news that Secaucus has received two new grants that will help us continue our infrastructure improvement projects in Town. I am especially happy with a \$2.9 million grant from the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) that will fund much needed refurbishment of the entire stretch of Seaview Drive. The roadway is impacted by heavy freight traffic and has needed repair for some time. Our proposed improvements will include milling and repaving the roadway, new curbs and sidewalks, cutouts for buses to accommodate safe boarding, and a bike lane. Thanks to the grant, this massive project can be completed without impact on the Town budget.

Although much smaller than our NJDOT grant for Seaview drive, I am happy that we received a Local Recreation Infrastructure Grant (LRIG) to refurbish the water and spray feature at Buchmuller Park. In the warmer months, children love cooling down in the water sprays. We would like to replace the spray feature with new, reliable equipment, and more importantly, upgrading it for more fun.

Both these grants have just been awarded and we will have to go through several steps including planning, designing, bid selection, construction, and final approval. I will bring you updates as the projects progress.

We are also planning on a ribbon-cutting ceremony to officially open the extended Park at Farm Road (adjacent to Acorn Park). We will continue to beautify the area with native plants as the weather gets warmer. We are also progressing on an agreement with the NJSEA to utilize the adjoining land to the east to extend the park even further. Again, I will share details as we make progress.

Before I sign off, I would like to remind our residents to come out and support the Memorial Day Parade on May 20th . See you there!

Attendees had a great time learning about the functions of various departments, and especially sharing their parent's workspace for the day. Mayor Gonnelli welcomed them to the special program as Town Administrator, Gary Jeffas, and Town Attorney, Keri Eglentowicz, explained the functions of various departments and led them on a scavenger hunt and tour of Town Hall. A stop at the Police Headquarters, a tour of the inside of a Secaucus fire truck, tips by the Environmental Department on how to go green, a visit to all departmental offices at Town Hall, a pizza lunch, and of course a generous bag of toys, arts and crafts from Mayor Gonnelli—all made a perfect way to spend time at their parent's workspace.

Community Comes Together for Autism Awareness

April is Autism Awareness and Acceptance month and was marked by several initiative across the Town of Secaucus which culminated with the Town Council passing a resolution at the April 25th meeting. The Secaucus Police Department and PBA held a themed t-shirt fundraiser with all proceeds benefitting EPOS, a program geared towards enriching the experiences of individuals with autism. Town employees participated in a "wear-blue-to-work-day" and also made monetary donations to benefit EPOS. Blue lights brightened gazebo lights around Town and a large sign marking April as Autism Awareness Month was installed. The goal of these efforts was to raise awareness about the developmental and communication disabilities that affect those with autism, to accept and celebrate the immense contributions of individuals with autism, and to support their families.

Canine Brix Joins Police Department

In September, 2022, the Secaucus Police Department re-established the Canine Unit, which was on pause after K9 Strobe retired two years earlier. The nineteenmonth old German Shepherd, named Brix was purchased from Connecticut Canine Services with money from forfeited funds and officially received his badge from Chief Dennis Miller at the Town Council Meeting on April 25th. Canine Handler, Tyler Pein, and Brix have undergone twenty-nine



weeks of vigorous training at the Bergen County Sheriff's Canine Academy, which culminated on April 14, 2023. This Secaucus Police Canine Patrol Team have been trained in agility, obedience, article/evidence searches, scent work, tracking, criminal apprehension and handler protection. Brix has also been trained to detect various controlled dangerous substances, except for marijuana.

The Canine Unit is assigned to the Operations Section and will assist the Secaucus Police Department in furthering proactive policing. Brix will also be utilized for community demonstrations in hopes of enhancing our community policing efforts.

In September, 2020, the Secaucus Police Department established the first Canine Unit in its history, with a very generous financial donation from the Steven Strobert Foundation. The nine-month-old German Shepherd, named Strobe in memory of Steven Strobert, was purchased from Connecticut Canine Services. In 2021, K-9 Strobe was retired after his handler, Police Officer Vince DeFazio, was promoted to Sergeant.

NEW—Pay for Parking on the ParkMobile App

Residents and visitors now have a convenient new option for paying for parking in Secaucus. As of May 1, 2023, parking fees may be made via the ParkMobile app. Coin payments are still available at all freestanding parking meters. The Northend Municipal Lot and Centre Avenue Municipal Lot will accept parking payments solely through the ParkMobile app.

Things to Know:

- The ParkMobile app is free to download on the App Store and Google Play Store.
- When parking, open the ParkMobile app, enter the zone number listed on the parking meter signs onto the app to quickly pay for parking. Use the app to pay for parking and extend your parking session remotely.
- Remember, all posted restrictions will still be in effect. For example, residential parking, street cleaning, and time restrictions for certain parking spots will still apply as posted.
- Parking Enforcement Officers will use your license plate number and zone number to view your ParkMobile payment on a handheld device. Please check your license plate number before confirming your parking session.

Report Sale of Flavored Vapes

In 2020, New Jersey became the first state in the nation to ban flavored e-cigarettes and flavored vaping devices. Research showed that flavored electronic smoking devices and products such as candy, fruit and chocolate are extremely appealing to children and young adults. Evidence of the detrimental health effects and the addictive nature of these devices is irrefutable. Despite New Jersey's ban, flavored vapes are sold throughout the State, sometimes even to underage children. To prevent access to these devices, the Secaucus Health Department and Secaucus Coalition call on all residents to report sale of flavored vaping devices and products in New Jersey to the Health Department by calling 201-330-2031. Repeat offenders are subject to fines and possible cancelation of licenses.


