Mayor's Corner

This month, I write to you about something that is dear to my heartkeeping taxes as low as possible. Our Municipal Budget has been introduced and we have been reviewing it continuously since the beginning of the year.

While we knew this year was going to be a difficult one, there were several line items, beyond our control, that increased substantially more than projected. The most impactful increases were in health insurance (23%), interest rates, and pension payments. These three line items resulted in an increase of approximately \$4 million to our budget. Our parking and hotel tax revenues are still not back at pre-pandemic levels and, just like in your homes, inflation is making our purchases more expensive. Because of these stressors on our budget, it was impossible for us to avoid a municipal tax increase. The tax increase for an average home, which is assessed at \$178,101.00, will be about \$21.50 a month.

The decision to increase municipal taxes does not come easy. My administration

works closely with the Town Administrator, finance team and department heads to control expenses. Our goal always is and will be to keep taxes stable, while providing the highest level

of services and



programs to all our residents. Many of the infrastructure projects you see taking place in Town are being paid for by grants as we vigorously pursue funding for projects. In fact, we just received word we are being awarded an \$850,000.00 grant for a roadway improvement project to Plaza Center, from Route 3 to Paterson Plank Road.

I want to assure you that we will continue to work with every department to control costs now and into the future.

Latest Addition to Our Parks Systems Inaugurated

Farm Road Park, the newest addition to our parks and open spaces was formally inaugurated! The ribbon-cutting ceremony held on June 14, was led by Craig Guy from the Hudson County Executive's Office and Mayor Gonnelli, as members of the Town Council and Administration, Hudson County planning officials, and local residents joined in. The property, formerly the site of Estelle Laminations was purchased by the Town, then cleaned up



and developed thanks to a \$317,873 grant from the Hudson County Open Space fund. The Town has an agreement with the NJSEA to keep the adjacent property (formerly owned by Boulevard Tire) a recreational space for everyone to enjoy. Whether you want to stop at the gazebo on your jog through the Greenway or bring your dogs for some exercise at the dog run, or just soak in the beauty of the river at high tide, Farm Road Park is the place to be! Native trees and shrubs have also been planted, and a rain garden complete with native plants helps in mitigating rainwater runoff. A parking lot makes access easier for those who would like to drive there.

If you have not been to Farm Road Park yet, head to the dead-end on Farm Road off Paterson Plank Rd. You will be surprised how serene and beautiful the area is!

Secaucus Greenhouse Garden

Walk along the greenway or use the parking lot behind the new gymnasium at the Secaucus High School, and you'll see a futuristic-looking dome, a geodesic greenhouse made by Growing Spaces. This new greenhouse was funded in most part by a \$20,000 Sustainable Jersey Grant from the PSEG Foundation received by the Secaucus Environmental Department. The collaborative effort furthers the Secaucus



High School Environmental Club's community garden project. Installed by the DPW, it is currently undergoing finishing touches and is expected to be fully completed and open by mid-summer.

The structure made of recycled materials withstands snow, hail, and extreme weather conditions. The polycarbonate dome provides diffused lighting to the plants inside and has automatic vents that are heat-activated and require no electricity to operate.

"The greenhouse will serve both our students and community members who would like to participate in community gardens," according to high school principal, Mr. Viggiani. Students from the middle school and high school who work alongside the school greenhouse technician can access the greenhouse and plant seedlings in Winter. This new project will help promote eco-friendly experiments in a way that brings students and community members closer together as they work with one another on this great new addition to the town.

SPD Raises Funds for Special Olympics

On June 9th, the Secaucus Police Department held the annual Special Olympics Torch Run to join police departments around the State to raise funds for the Special Olympics. Police Officers, residents and students at all Secaucus schools joined in the effort. The run started at the Police Headquarters, stopped at Clarendon, Huber, Mill Ridge and Middle School/High School grounds. 2023 marks the 40th Anniversay of the New Jersey Law Enforcement Torch Run. The Special Olympics New Jersey's summer games took place from June 9th to 11th. Thank you SPD for participating in this special cause!

Service to Control Spotted Lanternflies

As the weather gets warmer, our area may see a swarm of spotted lanternflies, an invasive species that affects trees and plants. The Hudson Regional Health Commission has received a small health grant from the NJ Department of Agriculture to assist with control of spotted lanternflies and is accepting service requests from the public. If there is any tree of heaven (TOH) on your property, it will be treated with an insecticide. The treatment lasts several months. If there is a large population of SLFs on other infested trees, a different insecticide may be applied. All insecticides are registered with the US Environmental Protection Agency and the NJ Department of Environmental Protection, and do not present any significant health or environmental risks. Pets should never touch treated surfaces when wet. Service is provided as time and staffing allows. To make a service request, please call Hudson Regional Health Commission at 201-223-1133.

Historical Plaque Unveiled at Mill Creek Point Park



Members of the Calderone and Treacy families joined Mayor Gonnelli, Town Council members, and members of the Town Museum Board on June 24th to unveil a historical plaque at Mill Creek Point Park, as the sun played hide and seek, and a slight breeze cut through the humid air.

Some residents may remember, and others may have to imagine, Mill Creek Point Park bustling with activity. The waterfront was home to a tavern-restaurant, horse stables, skeet shooting and pistol range, and a marina. The restaurant, Tony's Old Mill, was built in 1947 by Anthony Calderone and was a favorite place to gather. At that time, roads ended in the Stonewall Lane area and there was no connecting path to Tony's Old Mill. Anthony cleared a pathway and put down shingles to build a road, locally known as Shingle Boulevard. In 1965, Arthur Treacy purchased the property and ran the restaurant. The Old Mill was the oldest building in Secaucus but fell into disrepair and was demolished in 2000. After the Treacy family donated the property to the Town, new parkland and recreational facilities were developed and the area was renamed Mill Creek Point Park.

As longtime residents say, a lot has changed in our Town and there is history in every corner. To explore more and dig into some interesting stories and photographs, head over to the Town Museum located at Plaza Center (open Saturdays 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and Thursdays 4:30 to 6:30 PM in Summer).
