Police Officers Honored for Saving a Life

Secaucus Police Officers Jonathan Padron, Christopher Boyko and Justin Pardo were honored at the Town Council meeting on February 28th for helping save the life of an unresponsive male at the Secaucus LA Fitness in December, 2023. Police Chief Dennis Miller applauded the officers for using their skills and training and congratulated them on a job done well.

Mayor's Corner

Since early January 2024, I have had several meetings with the school Superintendent and some members of the Board of Education regarding their thoughts for the future of the school system. I wanted to share the details as I understand them with you. There are three key components.

Redistricting: As has been discussed in public meetings, the redistricting of the elementary schools would group students of all grades together. For example, all those in kindergarten through 2nd grade would attend Clarendon School and all students in 3rd through 5th grade would attend Huber Street (this is just an example and not based grade distributions that have been decided). The thought is this will enhance educational instruction, provide consistency, better serve those with special needs, etc. Any potential redistricting plan has been delayed to September of 2025 to allow more time to completely evaluate the impacts.

Full Day Pre-K: The school district applied, and is hopeful, for a grant from the State of New Jersey to expand Pre-K for 3-4 yers-olds to full day. The proposed program would would service about 100 students and would be done in conjunction with area childcare centers to gain the additional space needed. Some classes will be held in the school buildings and others will take place in private facilities such as, St. Matthews, Harmony and

Kiddie Academy. The grant funds will provide funding for the teachers and staff at the outside facilities. As with the current Pre-K program, students will be chosen by a lottery system. The expanded program is expected to start this September.

School Expansion: When evaluating the aforementioned

proposed changes, coupled with the change in the use of classroom space to accommodate programs, special needs, changes in Department of Education standards, etc. there may be a need for expansion, mainly in our elementary schools. Therefore, the Board of Education is exploring possible scenarios for school expansion. I have asked the Superintendent to ensure adequate time is afforded to fully evaluate any possible expansion plans so they can ensure whatever path is chosen is well planned out, financially feasible and absolutely necessary.

Even though all decisions on school matters are made by the Board of Education, my Administration will continue to work with the Board and will support initiatives that are necessary, sound, and in the best interest of the education of our children.


